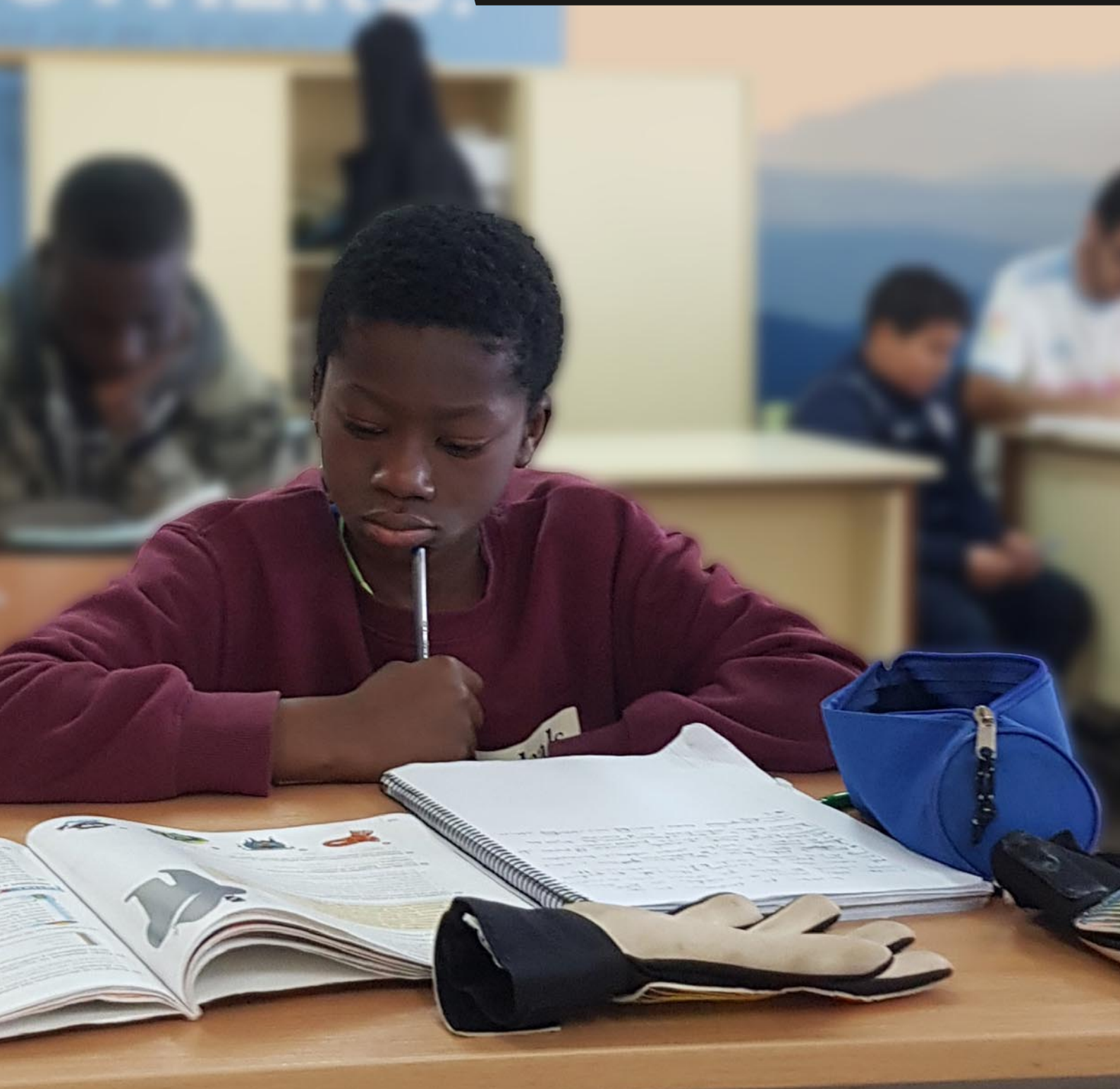

LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

VALE LA PENA



The year 2021 has also been marked by the pandemic and its effects. It has been a difficult year again, where we have felt the vulnerability we share as human beings and the reality of being exposed to pain and suffering. But we must also congratulate ourselves as a society because it has highlighted our more human character, solidarity, and commitment to others.

In 2021 we launched the "Vale la Pena" campaign, with which we set out to contribute to reflecting on the value of suffering. We think that the free, personal and social attitude that we have in the face of the pain and difficulties we are going through, marks the response we are able to give to social issues such as poverty, loneliness, racism, disease, pandemic, etc. Is it worth escaping and isolating yourself or approaching and accompanying the people who have had the worst time?

Facing our own or others' suffering makes us more human. We learn that to go through it the main help is to feel accompanied. After all, the most compelling reason to suffer – the most human – is love. Solidarity is just one of their surnames.

After a 2020 that transformed us and made us more aware and sensitive to the needs of others, we learned to respond more actively. A clear example is a social cuisine launched in the Madrid neighborhood of Carabanchel: a program in which we prepare food that we distribute through various soup kitchens in Madrid thanks to the participation of more than 80 volunteers and numerous companies that seek to collaborate with donations of food, supplies or economic donations that allow the sustainability of the project.

Another clear example is the response to the eruption of the Cumbre Vieja volcano in La Palma, where solidarity occurred as a domino effect. In International Cooperation we also mobilized and raised funds to help the recovery of 85 families who lost their homes.

From International Cooperation we work day by day not only to give way to solidarity actions but for each of these actions to be driven by a more humane reason, closer and more consistent with the dignity of each person. We promote responsibility, especially for young people, in the face of the social challenges that we have to live. We thank each person who collaborates with, an organization and institution that shares this commitment and that allows young people to take a leading role in helping and collaborating with others.

OUR OBJECTIVE

International Cooperation is a Spanish non-profit organization, 2017 State Award for Social Volunteering, Golden Cross of the Civil Order of Social Solidarity and declared a Public Utility Entity, which has been working since 1993 **“for a supportive youth”**. The NGO is also present through the **International Youth Cooperation** brand in its work outside of Spain.

From a christian conception of man, in International Cooperation we promote a culture of solidarity among young people and offer them the opportunity to engage in volunteer, education and awareness projects as tools for social transformation. We promote human development in accordance with the dignity of people. To do this, we create channels for social participation through **four lines of action**:



EDUCATIONAL SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY 1

We seek ways to involve the school, the family, and society as a whole, to raise awareness of their enormous potential for promoting a culture of social justice.



VOLUNTEERING 2

We create channels for the social participation of young people through volunteering and other solidarity actions in favor of those most in need.



SOCIAL INNOVATION 3


We develop the capacities and abilities of young people so that they become protagonists of social transformation.



DEVELOPING 4

In line with the SDGs, we understand development with a focus on expanding human rights and real freedoms of individuals.

WHAT DO WE DO

EDUCATIONAL SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

We work for a comprehensive academic training since early stages of education, for young people not to remain indifferent to their environment's needs. In this task we include school, family, and society. In order to do so, we facilitate tools to help educational institutions transmitting a culture focused on the common good, in line with United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals.

SOLIDARITY SCHOOL



Supportive School is a project for involving educational community in achieving Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). We help educational centers to develop their **Socio-Educational Responsibility** syllabus. This project counts on the support of the Valladolid Provincial Council, the Youth Institute of the Council of Castilla y León and the Council of Galicia.



WHAT WE OFFER:

- Advice for the design of an Educational Social Responsibility Plan (RSED Plan).
- Educational resources to improve knowledge of social needs, oriented to the Sustainable Development Goals.
- Training for teachers by providing tools that allow them to work with the educational materials that we provide to work on different social realities.
- Exhibitions, educational guides, audiovisuals, publications, web pages, resources for volunteering, forums and tools for social entrepreneurship, etc.
- We help in the implementation of the actions of the RSED Plan.
- Recognition as a Socially Responsible Center.
- Socio-educational support projects for minors in vulnerable situations.

FLYING TOGETHER



In the project **Flying Together**, which has a high content of STEM formation (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics), we work to reduce the educational gap which suffer minors in vulnerability situation. The program's goal is providing them with necessary tools to improve abilities which can help them in their personal development and their future, so they can aim for being what they want without barriers or limits.



EDUCATIONAL MATERIALS



We edit and disseminate educational materials such as training videos on social issues or traveling exhibitions, with awareness sessions offered to all educational centers that request them.

In 2021, the **Exhibition on Rare Diseases** was presented in the schools. A disease is considered "rare" when it affects less than 5 inhabitants per 10,000. 65% of them are serious and disabling, most chronic and degenerative. In addition to the suffering itself, is added the discrimination in different areas. This exhibition makes visible the real cases of Sara, Vega, and Nico, who suffer from tuberous sclerosis or Rett syndrome to bring this problem closer to boys and girls of school age.

Throughout the year we give numerous sessions based on these teaching materials in the educational centers in **Madrid, Castilla y León, the Canary Islands, Aragón, Andalusia, Galicia, and Castilla la Mancha.**

#Esoquenosune

This campaign aims to combat racism and xenophobia, hand in hand with the Ministry of Inclusion, Social Security and Migrations. **#esoquenosune** invites you to reflect on that that brings us closer to others, to those people we consider "different". through five real stories deal with some of the issues that unite us: project, commitment, friendship, love and team Young people who have been able to learn from differences and see them as something positive.

OBSERVATORY OF EDUCATIONAL SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY



2011, the purpose of which is to transmit to educational centers their responsibility in achieving the SDGs. This platform has an Academic Committee made up of experts and professors from universities in Europe and Latin America.

SOCIAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAM



The **PLS Program** offers comprehensive care to children and young people from immigrant and in a situation of social exclusion, who reside in the neighborhood of San Pablo, in **Saragossa**. Throughout the year, about **50 volunteers** participate in this educational project at the C.E.I.P facilities Santo Domingo. Through the **3 C's** (head, body and heart), they work with **100 boys and girls** from study, sports and volunteering. Within the framework of the PLS, the "**Hermano Mayor**" initiative promotes older than 2nd E.S.O, individually help another student from Primary, establishing new closer links and commitment among the beneficiaries themselves.

Thanks to the support of **Bergner**, the **Ministry of Citizenship and Rights Social Affairs of the Government of Aragon**, the **Ministry of Labor and Social Economy**, **Atlético de Madrid Foundation**, **Evair**, **Caixabank**, **Nemesio Díez Foundation** and **Patricia Ramírez (psychologist)**, this project enables these young people to improve their academic performance and personal. During the summer months, the **PLS Summer** is in charge of give continuity to this reinforcement of knowledge, skills and values with **34 children** from 2nd to 6th grade of Primary.

For the third consecutive year, **Tenerife** also helps 45 minors in a situation of social disadvantage, in the neighborhood of **San Andrés**. In addition to the reinforcement in the study and with the language, they are trained in emotional education, the development of effort, responsibility or respect. To carry out this socio-educational support, we have the help of the **DISA Foundation** and **Caja Canarias**.

A FUTURE FOR CHILDREN



With this project we offer tutoring, for the improvement of their academic performance, to children in vulnerability situation. Besides, we facilitate them tools to reinforce their personal and psycho-affective skills with different workshops and cultural, sport, technological, artistic, leisure and free time activities and volunteering. All of this is possible thanks to dozens of volunteers who spend their time helping children with homework and activities.

In **Galicia**, this educational program serves **49 minors** aged between 6 and 14 years of age, in **A Coruña**, **Santiago de Compostela**, **Pontevedra** and **Vigo**.

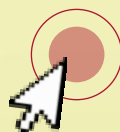

THE MANOLO SNAIL



Within the framework of the **#Quitaelmuted** campaign, the story "**El Caracol Manolo**" aims to give visibility to the homeless. The author of this history, **José María**, did not experience the hardness of the street thanks to the help provided by others, especially the brothers of San John of God. At present, he lives in a residence for people homeless. From this story, these contents are worked of awareness.

*The life of a homeless person is like that of Manolo the snail.
It is a curious thing, snails are born with an advantage that
we do not have; they have their house insured charged
on their backs without their weight weighing them down. a
person without home is one that does not have a house to live in

LEISURE AND FREE TIME



We have developed training actions for more than **60 youth associations** throughout Spain. In the months leading up to summer, the training was pointed to provide

procedures and action guides for the organization of leisure and free time activities. As part of this program, we promoted urban camps with minors in risk of social exclusion such as Villa de Vallecas (**Madrid**), Zaragoza (**Aragón**), San Andrés (**Tenerife**) and Pontevedra (**Galicia**). The latter, organized during the summer months, to facilitate the balance of families, and aimed at academic reinforcement, sports activity and environmental awareness.

NEW TECHNOLOGIES CODE



Nowadays the use of new technologies arises many challenges for young people. Our goal is to encourage a thoughtful attitude, so they can take advantage, ethically and effectively, of the numerous

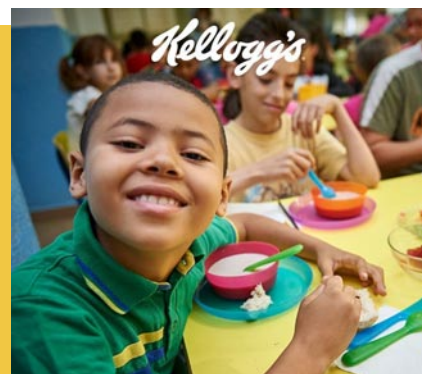
possibilities they are offered. This is the object of this training program, in the territorial area of **Castilla y León**, that is raising awareness in hundreds of young people about a profitable use of new technologies. This year **250 boys and girls** participated in our workshops and sessions.

HUMAN RIGHTS AND ODS AT SCHOOL



Awareness-raising project aimed at the attention of pupils with specific educational compensation needs. Promotes pedagogical activities in the centres to bring students closer to the

students to the knowledge of the Declaration on Human Rights and the relationship that the SDGs have with the dignity of the person. This initiative is supported by the **Ministry of Education and Vocational Training**, as part of the call for subsidies to entities for the compensation of inequalities in education.



EVERYONE TO BREAKFAST



This program, which develops International Cooperation with **Kellogg Company** contributes to the improvement of conditions of minors in a vulnerable situations offering them a daily breakfast, complete and balanced.

During the 2020-2021 academic year, served 152,840 breakfasts to 1,156 students from 12 educational centers citizens of **Madrid, Valencia, Valladolid, Málaga, Granada, and Seville**.

W. K. KELLOGG SCHOLARSHIP FOR STUDIES



Scholarships for studies W.K. KELLOGG is an initiative of the Kellogg Company, which developed in Spain in collaboration with International Cooperation.

These aids are addressed to beneficiaries of the program **"Everyone to Breakfast"** and that, wanting to carry out studies of Secondary or post-compulsory, have socio-economic difficulties to do so. Thanks to this support, we accompany these young people in their personal development, training and we promote their future employment.

In 2021, **three scholarships** were awarded to students of Compulsory Secondary Education. Currently, there are **seven scholarship students** in this Program.

WHAT DO WE DO VOLUNTEERING

Throughout the year, our volunteers participated in a wide variety of projects and initiatives, in Spain and abroad, for the benefit of the most disadvantaged sectors. In addition to the group to which each action is directed, young people are the main beneficiaries of our solidarity activities. And it is that the volunteering they do, under the motto "Living for others", leaves an indelible mark on them, which helps them to always have the perspective of service to others in everything they undertake.

DNA PROGRAM



Every year, we help cover the food needs of **families at risk of social exclusion** throughout Spain. From **Andalusia, 250 families** are helped, providing food, hygiene and cleaning items for the home, as

well as children's products. With the help of **65 volunteers**, we distribute **120 tons** of food

and other items throughout the year in the municipalities of Torrelblanca, Cerro-Su Eminencia, Alcosa-San Pablo and the Tres Barrios District (Seville).



In the **Canary Islands**, we promoted the distribution of food and other essential goods in the San Andrés neighborhood of **Santa Cruz de Tenerife** among more than **50 families** during Christmas. In the **Castilla y León Area**, we serve **18 families** with bi-monthly visits and supply of fresh food in **Burgos** and **Valladolid**, with the support of **30 volunteers** and La Caixa Foundation.

In **Madrid**, with the collaboration of the Food Bank and Fundación Inocente, we deliver **11,160 kilos of food**, as well as diapers and baby food to help **160 families each month**. In addition, educational centers in Madrid have carried out food collections that have been delivered to shelters for the homeless and soup kitchens.

BREAKFAST FOR OTHERS



The school performance of children in vulnerable situations can be affected by the lack of good nutrition. Around **35 volunteers** went to the schools first thing in the morning to prepare breakfast, serve it and organize fun workshops with the children before classes began. This year we distributed breakfast every day in Valencia to more than **70 children** in the **CEIP Raquel Payá, Amistad** and **Jesús-María Fuensanta**.



FRIDAY REVOLUTION



This project offers young people a different new plan to start weekends best way possible: investing time to those who need it. **Friday Revolution** has become a unique chance to discover volunteering, which hundreds of youngsters, despite the pandemic, have wanted to give it a try. Every Friday, around **600 volunteers** from **Madrid, Seville, Malaga, Cordoba** and **Granada** participated in snacks and breakfasts for homeless people, rehabilitation of houses through Painting For Others, visits to the elderly, leisure activities with minors or other activities. as a sport with people with disabilities.



I HAVE A MESSAGE FOR YOU



Although the isolation during 2021 did not occur in the same way as the previous year, the consequences of what was experienced are still very present. Many elderly people from the residences received an **audiovisual message** of encouragement, joy and hope, recorded by volunteers from companies, with their children, their pets... In addition, some received a Tablet to be able to access the messages, putting a solution, to the time, to the digital divide. This year, **60 elderly people** received a message full of affection and closeness in **Madrid** and **Toledo** thanks to the collaboration of **55 employees** from Allianz, INNOCV and Metro de Madrid. In **Zaragoza**, another **20 Bergner Europe employees** brought joy to **20 residents** of the Virgen del Pilar Social Center.



HOMELESS

3 GOOD HEALTH
AND WELL-BEING



Solidarity breakfasts and snacks are organized in all Territorial Areas to offer accompaniment to homeless people. During 2021, in **Valencia**, **60 volunteers** participated; in **Andalusia**, breakfasts were distributed in **Seville, Córdoba, Málaga and Granada**. Also, 25 volunteers walked the streets of **Oviedo** and **Gijón** every 15 days to support these people; and, in **Valladolid**, **15 university students** accompanied some **30 beneficiaries**, handing out hot drinks and offering conversation to these homeless people. In **Madrid**, every weekend, 70 volunteers help around 150 people in this situation.



BUSINESS SOLIDARITY DAY

17 PARTNERSHIPS
FOR THE GOALS



This new edition of the DSE 2021 brought together **240 volunteers** from **28 companies** and social entities, dedicated to improving the social and environmental conditions of the closest environment.

The volunteers participated in **18 solidarity initiatives** carried out in person and online with the elderly, people with functional diversity, children and immigrants. This great meeting has been organized since 2007 and this edition was held in **A Coruña, Seville, Valencia, Zaragoza, Madrid, Badajoz, Valladolid and Malaga**.

SOUP KITCHENS



In **Madrid**, more than **150 volunteers** from different youth groups and the Friday Revolution project cooked for homeless people and families in vulnerable situations in the soup kitchens of **San José** (Parish of San Ramón Nonato), **Canillejas** (Parish of Virgen Blanca) and the of the **Álvaro del Portillo Social Work** (Carabanchel).

In **Cantabria**, we have developed a stable accompaniment activity with residents in reception flats supervised by the Economic Kitchen.



VISTALEGRE SOCIAL KITCHEN



In March 2021 we inaugurated this project with the aim of helping people and families in vulnerable situations to cover their basic food needs. La Cocina, which was born with the help of **Palacio Vistalegre, Instituto Tecnológico Fuenllana** and **Grupo La Fábrica** and which counts among its collaborators **Grupo Emperador, MVGM, BBVA Asset Management, Logista Parcel, Velilla Confeccion, Bergner, Intellect Search** or **ALD Automotive**, among others, it functions as a "central catering" that prepares menus and distributes them to soup kitchens in the most needy districts of Madrid.

More than **80 volunteers** involved in the project since its inception have made it possible for **400 weekly menus** to be prepared. Since its inception, the Kitchen has collaborated with the Social Dining Room of Torrejón de Ardoz, Tetuán and the San José de Carabanchel dining room, serving more than **11,000 menus** in 2021.

3 GOOD HEALTH AND WELL-BEING



More than **700 volunteers** have made **58 homes of families** at risk of exclusion more dignified and welcoming spaces. During 2021, the project was carried out in **Madrid**, where **33 homes** were rehabilitated with the help of **360 volunteers**. In **Andalusia** (Córdoba and Jerez) houses were painted, also in the **Canary Islands**, **Valencia** and in the cities of **Toledo**, **A Coruña**, **Santiago** and **Vigo**.

One more year, **Painting for Others** has the financial or logistical support of **Fundación Pryconsa**, **Fundación Montemadrid** and **CaixaBank** and **ALD Automotive** and with the transfer of materials by **Wenceslao García**, **Pintura y Diseño** and **Bricomart**.

ENVIRONMENTAL VOLUNTEERING



In this area, in 2021 beach cleanups, tree planting and waste collection in green areas were carried out.

In **Asturias** we organized six days of cleaning the San Juan de Nieva beach, with **80 volunteers** from Friday Revolution. In **Levante**, **20 young people** cleaned and rehabilitated a forest and received training on recycling. In **Galicia**, DSE volunteers were involved in garbage collection actions in Playa del Alba, removal of an invasive species in Arteixo and tree planting in Cullergondo.

CORPORATIVE VOLUNTEERING

17 PARTNERSHIPS FOR THE GOALS



We help companies in the development of social action and volunteering plans that involve employees in projects in favor of the SDGs. More than **200 volunteers** from companies such as **Ipsen**, **INNOCV** and **Edenred** carried out different solidarity activities such as accompanying elderly people in residences, helping in soup kitchens, housing rehabilitation and environmental activities.

From visits to amusement parks or paintball to cooking classes at La Zarola, **Bergner Europe** volunteers carry out one activity a month with the boys and girls of **CEIP Santo Domingo**. Each of them was attended by **15 children from the school** and **15 volunteers** who rotated on each occasion. These visits promote the development of social skills and the discovery of healthy alternative leisure and free time spaces for these minors.

Boeing also involves members of its team to give STEM workshops to boys and girls from the **"Flying Together"** socio-educational program, where they also learn about the work that these volunteers do within the company. Throughout the year they visit museums, theme parks and other recreational activities.

At the same time, **ALD**, one of the main collaborators of International Cooperation in logistics matters, participates in different volunteer projects such as solidarity breakfasts or Painting for Others.





SOCIAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAM VOLUNTEERING



The **Social Leadership Program** promoted from **Zaragoza** is based on seeking motivation for study, sports and life. This 360o comprehensive training initiative opens up new horizons. The **100 children** in vulnerable situations who participate in this program are very clear about the importance of giving as well as receiving. Once a week, they also get involved in a volunteer activity, in a complementary way to the educational and sports dimension of the PLS. These actions benefit **25 elderly people**, with whom they play bingo every week, and they also get involved through interactive games with boys and girls with disabilities.

SOLIDARITY EVENTS Solidarity Race



In Aragon we organise a 5 km race to support projects developed in the area. From 28 May to 6 June, each participant could run whenever they wanted, registering their route in an application so that **Global Spedition** would donate €1 for each km reached.



MULTICULTURAL INDOOR FOOTBALL TOURNAMENT



15 teams (boys and girls) and a total of **116 young people** of different nationalities and gypsy ethnicity participated in this tournament. The objective was for the children to get to know each other and promote the values that sport transmits, such as camaraderie, respect or humility, as well as teamwork. Two prominent ex-players from Real Valladolid, **Javier Torres** and **Alberto López**, attended the closing of the event and spoke about the values in sport.

INTERNATIONAL VOLUNTEER PROGRAM



After the stoppage of the pandemic, international volunteering begins to recover in 2021. During the month of July, a group of **10 volunteers** from the **Territorial Area of Aragón** accompanied **140 children** from the Children of Paradise social sports school and repeated the activity in October where children from the La Creche orphanage in **Tangier** (Madrid) joined tricks).

At the moment it is the only international volunteer service after the pandemic, although volunteer meetings were held in **Valencia** with people from **Senegal** to promote the volunteer trips that will take place in 2022.

During the year, some groups also attended educational leisure activities in **Lisbon** with IYC Social Emergency.





A SMILE FOR CHRISTMAS



1 NO POVERTY



For almost 30 years, through the A Smile for Christmas campaign, we have been working so that thousands of children and their families feel the warmth and closeness of the holidays despite the particular situation they may be experiencing at home. With the special collaboration of **Ban-kinter** and **BNP Paribas** and the notable participation of **Fundación Telefónica**, the employees of **66 companies in Spain** donated a total of **7,308 personalized gifts** to boys and girls from families at risk of social exclusion. The collaboration of more than **1,500 young volunteers** from all the Territorial Areas was added, who promoted more than **300 social initiatives** that included the delivery of food, sending of congratulations by video to older people, plays and other charitable activities.

STROLL FOR A GOOD CAUSE

With the collaboration of **Telefónica**, the **Madrid City Council** and citizen participation, which pedaled during the month of December on stationary bicycles located in the Gran Vía Telefónica store, we distributed gifts to children in **Spain** and **15 other countries**.

WHAT DO WE DO DEVELOPING



Development Cooperation has been one of the strengths of the International Cooperation work, since its inception. Our projects are focused on improving the quality of life, fighting against poverty and inequality, of the most disadvantaged communities. To do this, we work hand in hand with local entities in the countries where we implement development initiatives so that they are the protagonists of their progress.

GUATEMALA

Nutrition and medical assistance



We understand family as a structure of basic solidarity and as main priority factor social, supporting the projects of cooperation to form development cross bracing of family ties.

Malnutrition in the municipality of **Génova Costa Cucade** in the department of **Quezaltenango** is very pronounced. This project aims to reinforce the nutritional deficiencies, medical assistance and monitoring of **25 families** living in the **Aldea de San Miguelito** that have been affected by the pandemic. In collaboration with Fundap, we developed this pilot project from January to December 2021 to train, accompany and provide assistance and medical follow-up to vulnerable families after COVID-19. With this project it is expected to be able to improve the nutritional levels of **100 direct beneficiaries** of the area through food supplements and health care.

GAMBIA Y SENEGAL

Education



In **Senegal**, the distance and difficulties to get to school increase the high rate of absenteeism. Thanks to the **Gupy Association**, the **Municipal Transport Company (EMT)** of **Valencia**, the children of the villages near the schools of **Kadiamor** and **Djikesse**, in southwestern Senegal, will have easier access to education thanks to the donation of a bus for school transportation.

In **Gambia**, we collaborated with the **St. Anthony Nursery School** in Kololi (Banjul) to build the Primary building. The commitment to these schools improves education and opens up new future opportunities for the most vulnerable children.

EL CONGO

Help mothers and babies



The Mama Forfait Social Program emerged to improve the care of pregnant women and the care of newborn babies, at the **Monkole Hospital**, in the **Kinshasa** neighborhood. Thanks to the **Grants for Social Action Projects of the Mutua Madrileña Foundation**, this initiative offered mothers a program during 2020 and 2021, which included prenatal consultations, ultrasounds, care during childbirth or caesarean section and possible neonatal problems.

To this end, work was done to reduce the high rates of maternal and infant mortality, through direct attention to these groups.

COSTA DE MARFIL

Improved health



The **Social Walé medical center** in **Yamoussoukro**, the capital of the **Ivory Coast**, will have a new space thanks to the help of **Lazard Funds Managers**. This center to which the aid will go is located in a neighborhood where the majority of the migrant population is from the north of the Ivory Coast and neighboring Saharan countries: Burkina Faso, Mali and Niger. Since 2004, the center has offered care in pediatrics, general medicine, obstetrics and gynecology to people without resources. This project benefits **16,000 people**, through quality health care, focused on maternal, child, psychological and community health for people with HIV among the most vulnerable sectors.

Football is life



This project, in collaboration with **Enfants du Paradis**, promotes integration through sport. Since 2007, when the Association created a center for **children with disabilities** in **Tangier**, they have been working to achieve full social, school and labor integration for these minors and their families. With the help of **Bergner**, this program complements the educational and social work of the Association. In 2021, **113 minors with disabilities** participated in sports activities that take place three days a week at the Mghogha facilities. And, in a complementary way, **social volunteering** is promoted to work on the civic commitment of young people in Tangier.

INDIA

Second Chance



Comprehensive rehabilitation and development program for women and girls in the "red light" area of **Mumbai** in collaboration with the local NGO **Grace Harvest Ministry**. This area does not reach the minimum level of health security. 60% of trafficking victims are infected with AIDS and HIV. Many of them are unable to return to their homes and are shunned as they are homeless and without livelihoods. They only have to live on the street. Through "Second Chance" we seek to improve their professional training in the art of sewing and training in values. In 2021, 24 women participated in the program for 4 months in three groups between 15 and 45 years old.

INDIA

Water for all



This program focuses on the installation of drinking water connections and filters in the **Baiganwadi** slum (Mumbai), where more than 200,000 people live. 78% are in a situation of extreme poverty, without the possibility of having the most basic resources, such as access to clean water. The objective of **Water For All** is to contribute to the solution of this problem that violates dignity and the right to health. This project is carried out in collaboration with **Bergner** and **Lok Seva Sangaam**, a local association with which International Cooperation has been working since 2012 on various educational programs in the slum.

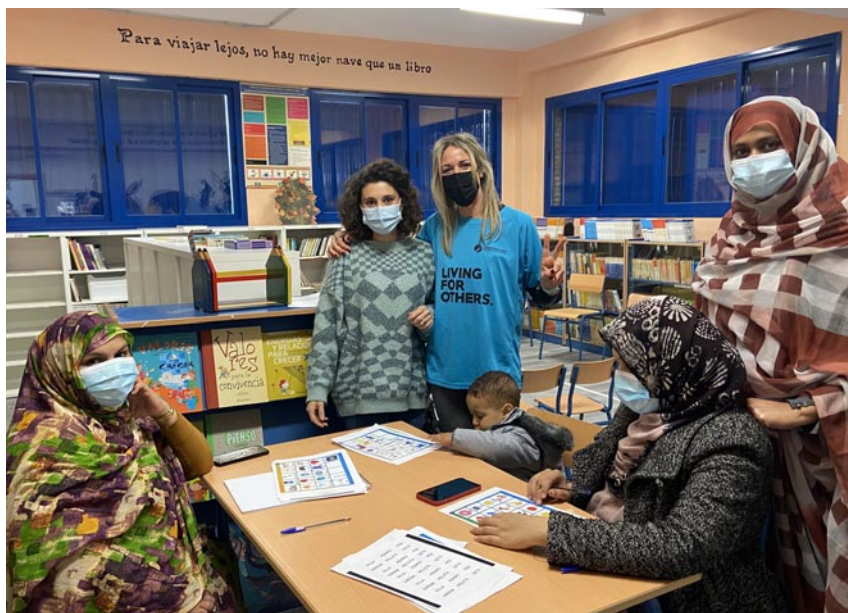

WHAT DO WE DO SOCIAL INNOVATION

International Cooperation works from this area to develop the skills and capacities of young people seeking their active participation in social transformation.



SCALE UP



17 PARTNERSHIPS FOR THE GOALS



This training program helps manage talent of young people, measure it and certify it, to improve their skills and employability. In Madrid, in person and online, training courses were given for coordinators during 2021-2022 and for volunteers in several weekends, with 35 young people.

In **Galicia**, workshops and courses were given in **17 entities**, with **1,235 young people (14-23 years old)**, with the aim of promoting soft skills, developing skills through volunteering and leadership, with the support of the **Xunta de Galicia**. Among the participating entities there are university halls of residence, educational centers and youth associations such as **EFA Fonteboa** and **A Cancela** and the **IES Pontepedriña**.

In **Levante**, with the support of the **Generalitat Valenciana**, we impart 12 sessions on skills acquired through volunteering (order, effort, teamwork, empathy) and on the use of the online platform by Scale Up.

In **Castilla y León**, two courses have been developed on skills and employability for **65 young people** from Palencia, Burgos, León, Salamanca and Valladolid.

FORMATION PROGRAMS



10 REDUCED INEQUALITIES



Since our inception we have collaborated in the organization of conferences and meetings on innovation and training for young people. In 2021, thanks to the Culture and Assistance Foundation, we collaborate with aid to young people with economic difficulties to participate in the **University Conference of the Pyrenees (JUP)**. In this summer university in the Pyrenees, organized since 1983, more than 200 university students from 25 Spanish and international universities meet each summer. Through seminars, conferences and colloquia, the theme "Navigate. Seeking a solid education in a liquid society" was explored.

Thanks to the Culture and Assistance Foundation, we also collaborate in the **XXIX Humanistic Conference**, which brings together young people for their cultural and social concerns. The activities are carried out with work groups divided into areas of interest between Philosophy, Music, Cinema, Communication, History, Literature, Art and Theater. Two annual meetings are held: the winter edition (blended) with groups of young people from Barcelona, Valencia, Segovia, Valladolid, Seville and Bilbao, connected virtually with the Madrid headquarters; and the summer one, which took place in Huesca.



SERADE PROGRAM: VALE LA PENA

10 REDUCED INEQUALITIES



This Program has promoted equality and human rights since 1998, and has the support of the **Ministry of Social Rights and the 2030 Agenda**. Every year we carry out a campaign whose objective is to reflect on the actions that lead to a change in the world, intercultural coexistence, solidarity and social commitment.

The current "**Vale La Pena**" campaign contemplates the issue of suffering and how it can make us more human and supportive. Through a series of videos starring six people, their stories convey that it is "worth it" to go through some difficulties since they can mean not only resilience, but also an expression of love and service to others. The dissemination of the campaign was carried out through social networks, as well as the exhibition of **500 posters** in the Madrid **Metro network**.

WOMEN AND SOCIAL INNOVATION

5 GENDER EQUALITY



Women are climbing positions day by day in their right to equal opportunities and their empowerment, so that they can contribute the best of their feminine talent to society, today it becomes a necessity to achieve true progress. In International Cooperation we work to improve their training, broaden the horizon of their personal and professional concerns and favor their social participation, promoting equality between men and women, to achieve a more inclusive society.

WOMEN YOUTH TALENT

Created for young girls between **14 and 19 years** of immigrant origin, this program seeks to strengthen their character, promoting their talent and teaching them to be independent. In 2021, we worked with **20 young** people from the **San Juan** neighborhood in **Zaragoza** who received training from Paris/64, promoted sports, visited companies and developed leisure activities.

KAMATHIPURA: SECOND CHANCE

Thanks to the support of **Bergner Europe** and with the collaboration of the local organization **Grace Harvest Ministry, Second Chance** works for women and girls used for sexual purposes in the "red light" area in Mumbai. Through sewing courses and training in values, the aim is to rescue the girls from slavery, train them for employment so that they can get a job and provide training in basic skills related to health, education and the legal framework to achieve their independence, and autonomy.

WOMEN AND LEADERSHIP

Throughout the year we work with youth associations to promote women's leadership through workshops focused on innovation, skills development and character building.



SPANISH FOR IMMIGRANT WOMEN



From the **Territorial Area of Andalusia**, equal opportunities are sought with the competence of the language for Moroccan mothers in **Seville**. The courses are given twice a week in the neighborhood of San José de Palmete, with **11 women**. These beneficiaries are derived from Save the Children, while others are mothers of children who attend the Socio-educational Support of the NGO.

HELP FAMILIES IN LA PALMA

3 GOOD HEALTH AND WELL-BEING



The eruption of the Cumbre Vieja volcano left thousands of families in **La Palma** without many of their basic needs covered, and for many it meant the loss of their home. From the **Canary Islands**, we created the "**Back Home**" campaign, in collaboration with **VI-**

SOCAN, a public housing company in the Canary Islands, for the purchase of furniture and other materials for **87 affected families**.

In fundraising, a solidarity stream was carried out at the initiative of **Siro López**, a Spanish sports journalist, in which **Ibai Llanos** and other influencers participated. At the same time, one of our volunteers promoted donations at Giving Google Week 2021, becoming the third campaign in Europe.



INTERNATIONAL YOUTH COOPERATION

17 PARTNERSHIPS FOR THE GOALS



Since 2015, when the **International Youth Cooperation (IYC)** was created, we have reached a presence in **12 countries**: Estonia, Croatia, Portugal, Hungary, Ireland, Spain, the Netherlands, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Latvia, Finland and Sweden.

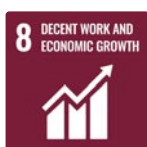
At IYC we want to reach young Europeans and foster in them a culture of responsibility and solidarity, through social action programs in favor of children and youth, training programs and volunteer exchanges with young people.

After a 2020 in which the pandemic determined many of the projects in each country, in 2021, **IYC Sweden** continued with workshops on technology for the elderly and with food deliveries for vulnerable families. In **IYC Finland** increased its network of volunteers and projects, in addition to solidarity markets and food delivery, ecological volunteering, concerts for adults and seminars on SDGs were organized. **IYC Hungary** has been present for the elderly despite the COVID measures still in place and gave concerts from the garden of the Budapest Hospital for all residents.





INSPIRING YOUTH



This initiative has its main goal in **promoting youth entrepreneurship** oriented towards social projects. Inspiring Youth includes a digital platform -www.inspiringyouth.es- where young people can connect and find resources for undertaking and collaborating in a social community where they can develop the **necessary skills for their professional future**.



There are three different ways of participating in Inspiring Youth:

- Creating a project so other people could join.
- Adding yourself to the development of a project which currently exists in the platform.
- Providing advice as a professional and mentor of the initiatives.

In **Aragón**, Inspiring Youth sought the inclusion of all the groups that live in the **San Pablo** neighborhood in **Zaragoza** with training for social entrepreneurship and self-employment, promoting initiative, teamwork, communication and project management. This program is changing many lives of boys and girls who find a new impetus for their training and their aspirations, thanks to the support of the Aragonese Institute of Social Services (IASS) and the European Social Fund (ESF, Building Europe from Aragón), of the EU.

TRANSPARENCY AND ACCOUNTABILITY

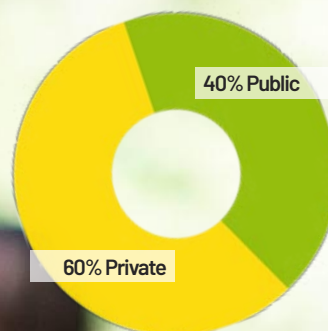
We present the economic report with the financial statements for the year 2021. The annual accounts of International Co-operation are audited by DBF AUDIFOR, S.L.

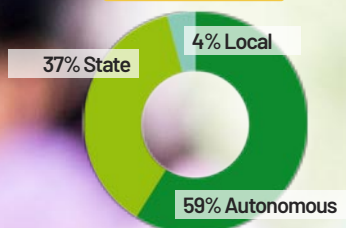

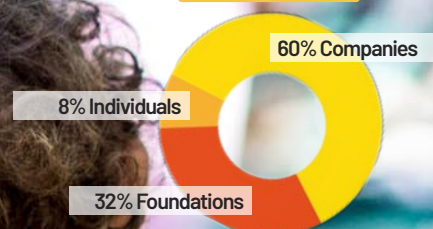
SOURCE OF INCOME



BREAKDOWN OF PUBLIC ORIGIN



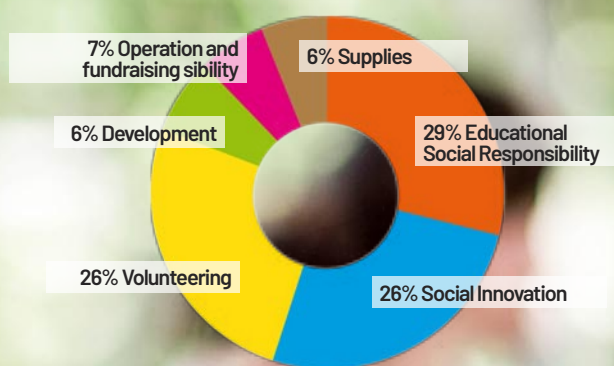
PRIVATE ORIGIN BREAKDOWN



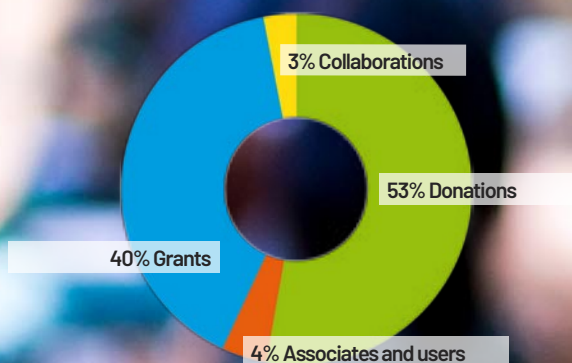

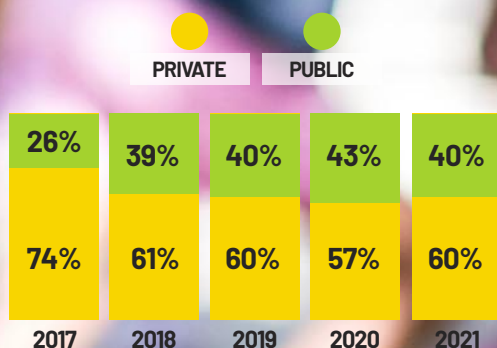
